

Evaluation goals

- Assess changes in organizations' capacity related to operating in a trauma-informed and healing-centered way.
- Contribute to better understanding the impacts of teams' RBN work on experiences of patients, families, and staff.

- **Promote learning** by documenting promising practices and lessons learned
- Provide **real time information to CCI** about program progress and participant experience.
- Inform the broader ACEs movement by synthesizing results and learnings related to the RBN program

Purpose: assess current organizational practice and capacity related to trauma and resilience-informed pediatric care



Team engagement in the assessment

- 78 people across all 15 RBN teams collaboratively completed the assessment in late Jan/early Feb
- 2-8 participants per team
- Most teams had diverse, multi-disciplinary participation including representatives from both primary care/pediatrics and behavioral health
- Participants represented a variety of roles including clinical and non-clinical staff and organizational leadership



RBN teams are starting in different places in their journeys to be healing organizations



On average, teams' ratings related to practices in the four RBN domains clustered around 2 and 3 (medium/variable levels or less)

Program domains average score distribution (# of teams)




Average scores in the: \blacksquare 1s \blacksquare 2s \blacksquare 3s \blacksquare 4s \blacksquare 5s


